

# **Getting ready for New Zealand – some helpful links**

To prepare for your new life in New Zealand, here are some tips to help you find out what you need to do before you arrive and during your first few weeks.

Included are some links to English language websites you might find helpful.

## Bring enough money

When you first arrive in New Zealand, you will have to pay for many things, including:

- food
- warm clothes, and
- transportation.

Many things cost more in New Zealand than they do in the Pacific Islands. ## Find a place to live

Unless you are staying with family or your employer has arranged a place for you to stay, you will need to find a place to live. It is a good idea to decide to live close to your place of work, or where you have good access to transport to your new workplace. We also recommend that you live somewhere with internet access.

## Get a tax number

You will need an Inland Revenue (IRD) number before you can start working. You can apply for this from the IRD website.

#### Open a bank account

You can apply online or in person to open a New Zealand bank account. Wages are usually paid directly into a bank account.

## Bring a mobile phone

You can use your mobile phone in New Zealand as long as it is unlocked. You just need to buy a prepay SIM card sold at the airport and retail stores.

If you phone is not unlocked you should contact your mobile phone retailer, or you can buy a new one in New Zealand.



### Learn about New Zealand work culture

You and your partner can join Pacific Work Connect. It is a free programme that offers workshops, one-on-one career coaching and other resources, delivered by Pacific career consultants.

Excellent public transport options exist in most areas. This can often be paid for by cash or by using travel cards bought from many supermarkets. Having your own car may help you move around easier, but these may be expensive to buy and run.
